

IATA REGULATIONS FOR SHIPMENTS CONTAINING BATTERIES

Effective January 1, 2015, lithium metal batteries shipped without equipment are prohibited on passenger aircraft.

While all lithium batteries are classified as hazardous materials (also referred to as dangerous goods), there are exceptions for common small size lithium batteries that simplify the rules for shipping these items.

Regulations differ depending upon what type of battery you are shipping (lithium ion or lithium metal) and whether you are shipping batteries packed without equipment, batteries packed with equipment, or batteries contained in equipment.

Please contact your TWI Representative as soon as possible if you are shipping batteries, or your equipment contains batteries of any kind (including laptops and tablets), so that we may inform you whether IATA packaging and labeling requirements pertain to your shipment.

There may also be additional restrictions involved in the return of your shipment, depending on the country from which it will be returning.

 Failing to inform us ahead of time regarding any batteries that are contained in your shipment may result in delays or refusal by the airlines to accept the shipment.
